onflict between the United States and the United Kingdom on the high seas touched off the War of 1812 or "the war for sailor's rights."

The Napoleonic Wars, which flared up in 1803, severely taxed the British Royal Navy, whose inshore squadrons blockaded French ports and constantly sought men to fill out their crews.

One unpopular answer was to impress American merchant sailors, a practice that eventually led President James Madison to declare of war against Great Britain on 18 June 1812.

In Letter of Marque, Georgia-based novelist Michael Aye wades into the clash, which often pitted brother against brother. Cooper Cain, the former pirate, is caught between America, his adopted country, and his ties to his native England.
